In 2023-24, OVEC staff provided thousands of hours of consulting to our member districts. New positions and grants expanded coaching and resources to the region. OVEC continues to provide exceptional network and role work-group opportunities and cutting-edge Professional Learning sessions. Districts benefited by receiving \$572,284.23 of direct funding for early childhood, technology, exceptional children, and teacher-recruiting programs. Districts also saved millions in basic services and maintenance due to our team’s knowledgeable bid negotiations. Our commitment to transforming the student experience continues. Our goal is to be intentionally present and to make educators’ work more fulfilling and sustainable.

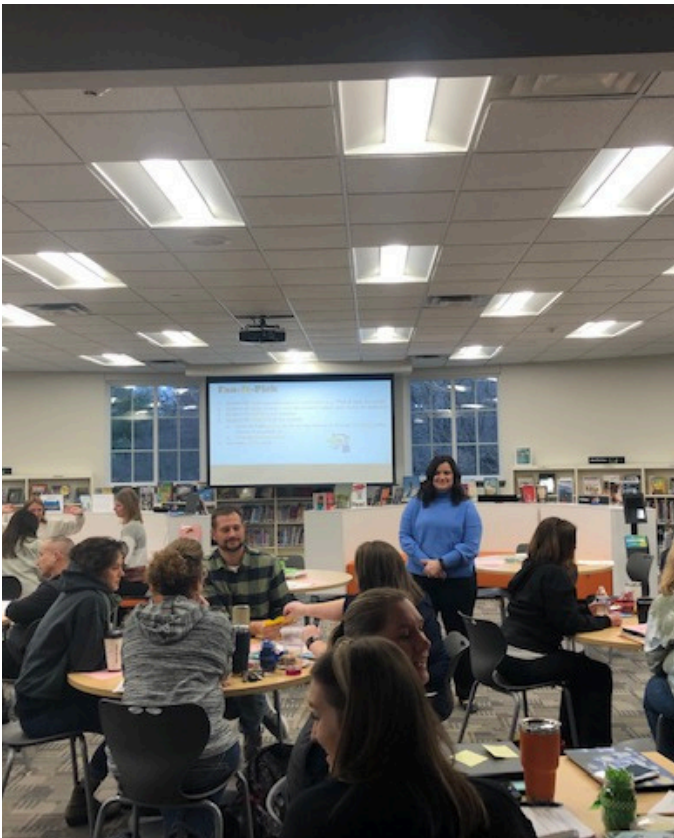

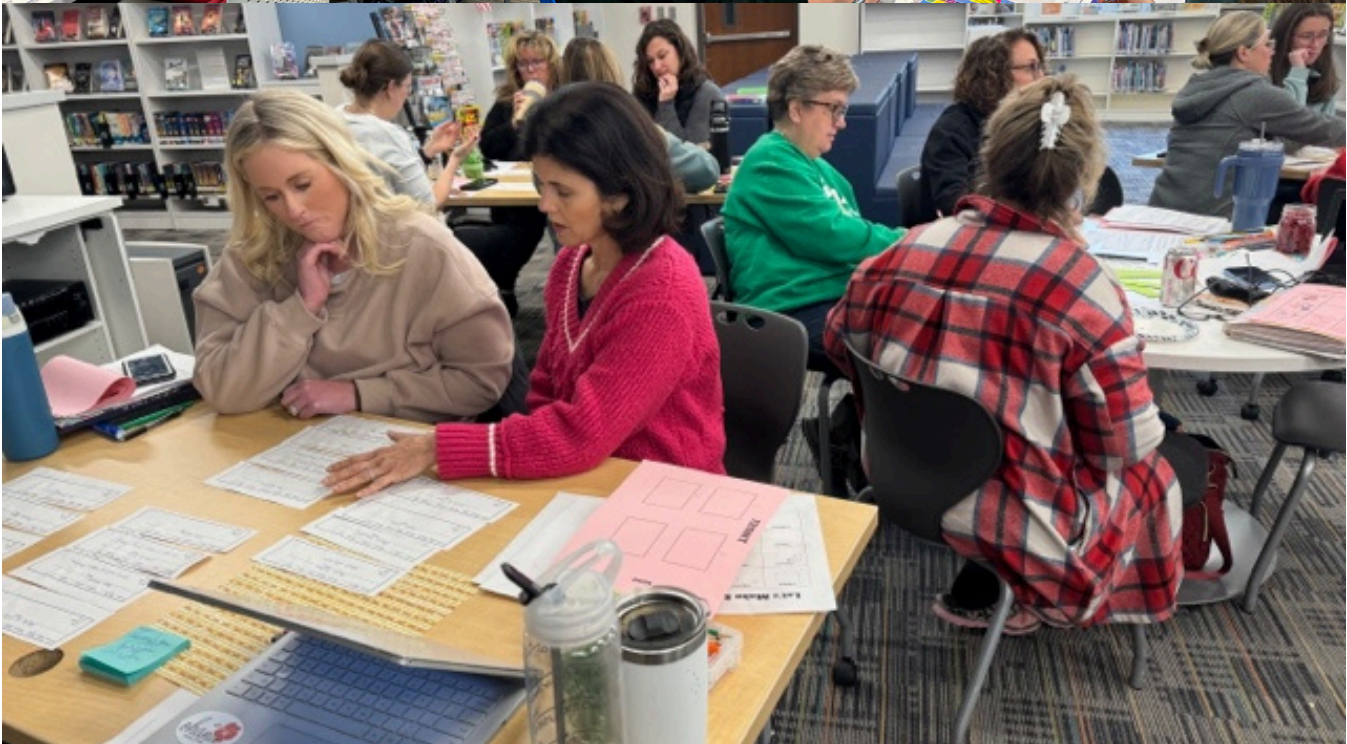

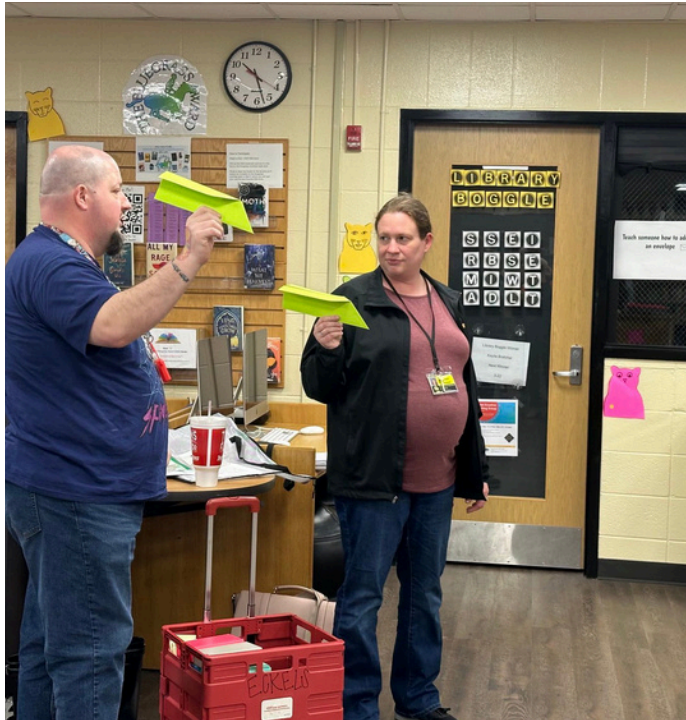

Teachers in Bullitt County Public Schools are leading the way for teachers across the state to build capacity to teach critical thinking and tech skills with Teach Tech KY. Bullitt County tapped teacher Travis Whitworth to serve as a coach for Teach Tech KY, after his participation in the program last year. OVEC staff also provided trainings, coaching, and consulting regarding KAS, SEL, HQIRs, school nutrition, facilities planning, and more. Several Bullitt teachers participated in Teacher Navigators, administered by OVEC Deeper Learning Design Specialists. Deeper Learning staff also worked with Bullitt schools to develop authentic learning experiences. With the help of a new grant, OVEC placed 2 school-based counselors in Bullitt schools to support social and emotional growth of students. OVEC's new Educator Success efforts impacted Bullitt teachers with opportunities for tuition reimbursement, cutting-edge national training, and increased rank-change offerings. Educator Success staff also supported administrators in reformatting and strengthening Bullitt's Teaching and Learning Pathway. Data guru Alexandra Hughes also worked with Bullitt schools to ensure every student population was receiving supports needed to be successful. District Support Services staff provided thorough MTSS guidance and training. Old Mill Head Start opened for its first school year. It was another successful year for Bullitt County's partnership with OVEC!

With OVEC's help and the leadership of Superintendent Casey Janes, Carroll County has made significant strides in building a climate of joy and a culture of engagement in their schools. Carroll County worked with Deeper Learning Design Specialists to revision their Profile of a Learner in their journey to improve the student experience. Middle school students enjoyed a new home-base system, murals, and SEL program CharacterStrong. With the help of a new grant, OVEC placed a school-based counselor in Carroll County to support students' mental health. The addition of OVEC's Educator Success area impacted Carroll County with opportunities for teachers from other career paths to receive certification and current teachers to pursue rank changes with tuition reimbursement available. Educator Success is also working with Carroll County teachers and administrators to strengthen their Teaching and Learning Pathway. Through iLEAD Academy, Carroll County students can receive internships and graduate with associate degrees in high-demand, high-wage job sectors. OVEC also provided Carroll County educators training and guidance about ECS, HQIRs, KAS, SEL, school nutrition, and more.

Eminence Independent teachers grew in their capacity to design lessons that last this year with the help of Deeper Learning Specialists. In fact, the district hosted a regional 2-day School on FIRE Conference, encouraging the work of Deeper Learning in classrooms beyond their district. OVEC Head Start (HS) programs in the Eminence Independent School District continued to grow with newly renovated facilities and outstanding family outreach. With the help of a new grant, OVEC placed a school-based counselor in an Eminence Independent school to support students' mental health. Eminence is one of 6 OVEC districts who had math teachers participate in Teach Tech KY, a program through which teachers receive microcredentials in computer science and computational thinking instruction. OVEC's new Educator Success efforts opened doors for Eminence Independent staff to pursue certification and rank changes, with tuition reimbursement available for many of these programs. Eminence Schools also received guidance and training about ECS, KAS, HQIRs, mental health needs, school nutrition, and more.

Frankfort Independent was one of three districts in the OVEC region to receive the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Food and Nutrition Services Healthy Meals Incentives (HMI) grant. The district worked with OVEC Deeper Learning Design Specialists to rewrite their graduate profile and redesign their way of hosting defenses of learning. Four Frankfort Independent teachers received tuition reimbursement for certification or rank-change programs through OVEC's new Educator Success initiatives.

Gallatin County Schools special education classrooms continue to set the bar for hands-on classroom projects with support from OVEC ECS. Through OVEC's ARP Transition Grant, Gallatin County ECS teachers were able to participate in coaching from OVEC staff and provide ECS students effective classroom projects and summer activities. OVEC ECS also partnered with Gallatin County to host the Northern Transition Fair, one of three regional events for ECS students and their families. The fair was well-attended and offered 26 booths that provided information on everything from residential programs to employment opportunities. OVEC CRRSA staff coached principals, helped the district implement new HQIR reading curriculum and began selecting a new HQIR math curriculum. OVEC staff guided Gallatin in supporting students on every level with MTSS planning and coaching. With the help of a new grant, OVEC placed a school-based counselor in Gallatin County to support students' mental health. Many Gallatin students advance their academic growth and technical careers by participating in iLEAD, OVEC's high-tech STEM-focused high school. Gallatin County's Head Start and Early Head Start programs, administered by OVEC, provide dozens of students the opportunity to grow in academic, social, and emotional goals before starting Kindergarten.

Grant County was one of three districts in the OVEC region to receive the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Food and Nutrition Services Healthy Meals Incentives (HMI) grant that made the equipment, as well as classroom activities about nutrition, possible. With the help of a new grant, OVEC placed a school-based counselor in Grant County to support students' mental health. Both of these grants have made an impact in school culture and climate. OVEC Educator Success is reaching out to Grant County teachers to provide them rank-change training opportunities, like Teach Tech KY. Deeper Learning and CRRSA specialists have coached Grant County administrators, instructional coaches, and teachers about selecting HQIR and creating lessons that last. ECS teachers had the opportunity for encouragement and coaching with PL designed just for them.

Henry County Schools enjoys a productive partnership with OVEC. With the help of a new grant, OVEC placed a school-based counselor in Henry County to support students' mental health. OVEC Facility Services guided Henry County during roof renovations. Several Henry County students earned mentorships and diplomas through their participation in iLEAD Academy. Several Henry County teachers earned \$4,050 stipends and 6 microcredentials through Teach Tech KY, a computer science and computational thinking grant administered through OVEC. Additionally, some Henry County teachers received tuition reimbursement through certification and rank-change programs offered through OVEC Educator Success. Data consultant Dr. Alexandra Hughes helped administrators use data to understand gaps in academic and SEL growth, which led to positive changes in helping all students succeed. Some remarkable achievements this year include the Head Start program seeing growth in students through hands-on activities and generous donations, as well as strengthening the Teaching and Learning Pathway at the high school.

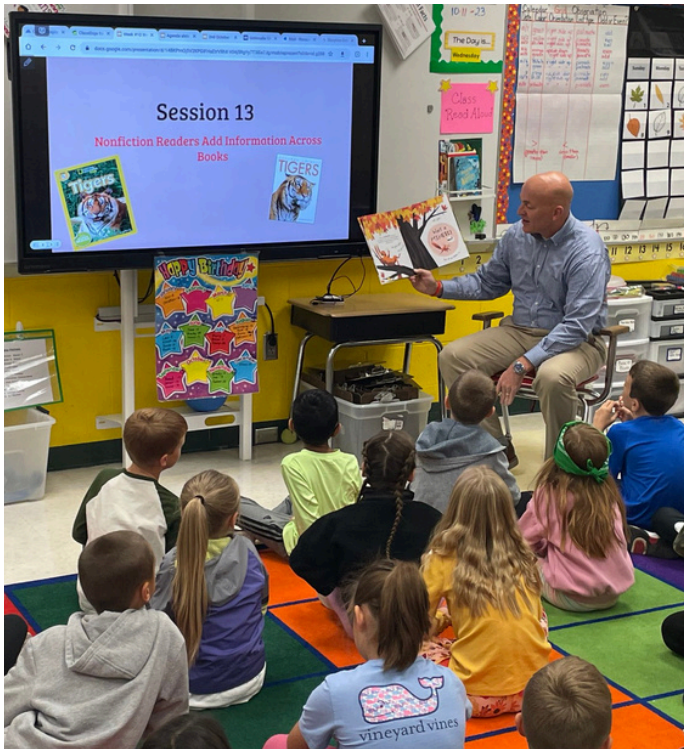

Many of these programs included tuition reimbursement or stipends. Data guru Dr. Alexandra Hughes also worked with Jefferson County schools to ensure every student population was receiving supports needed to be successful.

Shelby County Public Schools (SCPS) staff benefited from extensive coaching, training, and support provided by OVEC specialists in areas such as KAS, HQIR, MTSS, ECS, School Nutrition, Deeper Learning, and DEIB. The Head Start programs flourished, serving many students and families. Administrators and teachers gained from DSS network and role work groups. OVEC Facility Services assisted with bid negotiations and supported roofing projects at Shelby County schools. OVEC ECS hosted two well-attended Transition Fairs with 26 booths for families of special-needs students. OVEC CRRSA specialists collaborated with the MCMS principal on climate and culture building, curriculum implementation, and leadership development, resulting in improved student engagement and academic performance. Under Superintendent Dr. Sally Sugg, SCPS launched an Inclusive Excellence Network, involving representatives from each school, who worked with Dr. Alexandra Hughes and District Support Services consultants on MTSS and supporting unique student populations. A new grant enabled OVEC to place a school-based counselor in Shelby County for student mental health support. OVEC's Educator Success area provided opportunities for 10 teachers to pursue certification or rank changes with tuition reimbursement and collaborated with teachers and administrators to enhance the Teaching and Learning Pathway. Overall, it's been a year of engagement and growth for SCPS and OVEC!

Spencer County Schools administrators and teachers received training on several curriculum and classroom topics, ranging from MTSS and mental health issues to HQIR page-to-practice and Deeper Learning lesson design. OVEC CRRSA specialists have coached all four school principals and have worked to expand MTSS support for all students by working with their teaching-learning team. With the help of a new grant, OVEC placed a school-based counselor in Spencer County to support students' mental health. Spencer County students and teachers also received support from OVEC Pre-ETS and ECS specialists, HS and EHS programs, and School Nutrition Services. Spencer County received a United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Food and Nutrition Services Healthy Meals Incentives (HMI) grant, funding advances like new equipment and classroom nutrition lessons. OVEC Facility Services provided support during roofing projects. OVEC Educator Success offered several new certification and rank-change programs with tuition reimbursement available. Three teachers participated this year, and more are signed up for next school year. For the first time, Spencer County will have cohorts participating in Teach Tech KY. As our district continues to grow, OVEC continues to support each step of the way.

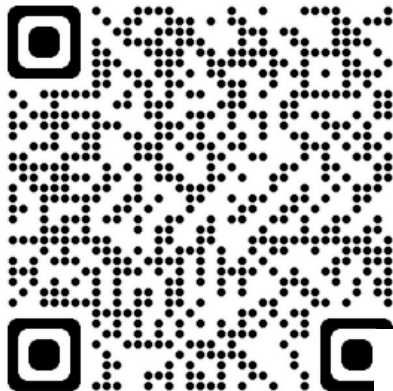

First Time - Long Time

One of our goals at OVEC is to make educators' work more fulfilling and sustainable. To provide mentorship to new teachers (teachers in their first 3 years or teachers seeking additional certification in a high-need area), we started a new teacher support and retention program called First Time - Long Time.
